1. Outdoor activities are endless

Across the state there are more than 80 old-fashioned swimming holes, dozens of lake-front beaches, and little hideaways to slip into the water on warm afternoons. The most well-known lake is Lake Champlain, but don't disregard it's smaller cousins around the state that may be less crowded on weekends due to being a "locals only" secret.

If water isn't your thing then consider a hot air balloon ride over the stunning landscapes of Vermont. The state has almost 50 different craft breweries, which is impressive since the state is quite small. Each summer the state holds the Vermont Brewers Festival on Lake Champlain. Breweries from Vermont and all over the country come to showcase their latest creations along with fan-favorites. The adults-only event often brings in more than 10,000 people and showcases local restaurants and food trucks. Even though the event is on hold for 2021, we look forward to its return in 2022.

3. Culinary adventures await the eager palette

Vermont is home to some of the most notable food brands of all time, including our favorite, Ben and Jerry's. You can pop over to the scoop shop to get a bowl or cone of your favorite flavors, and starting in October you can take a 30 minute tour of the factory where the famous ice cream is made.

If you're looking for something a little more on the savory side consider taking a day or two to explore the Vermont Cheese Trail, where you can visit and taste fresh cheese from cheese makers around the state. Along the trail you'll find familiar spots like Cabot, and some artisan cheese spots like Sage Farm Goat Dairy, which specializes in all things goat cheese.

4. Set up your tee time

Did you know there are over 75 golf courses in Vermont? There are plenty of opportunities to get to the tee box and attempt a hole-in-one here. Resort destinations around the state have the most golf courses, but you can pick up a round almost anywhere in the state. Some courses even date back to the 1920s, so you are literally playing in history.

5. Road trip on Route 100

One of the best parts about traveling is exploring the area, and sometimes that means going on a road trip. One of the most iconic routes through the state is Route 100, along the edge of the Green Mountains. The route stretches for 146 miles and goes right through the middle of the state with fun stops along the way. Throughout the drive you'll encounter historical sites, beautiful hotels, restaurants dishing out

scrumptious menus, and art museums and galleries.
